IF YOUR CAR LEAKS OIL IN THE DRIVEWAY, YOU MIGHT AS WELL LET IT LEAK IN THE OCEAN.

Rain washes pollutants into storm drains which flows directly into our streams, lakes, rivers and the ocean.

So what can you do?



WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH MOTOR OIL?

Oil does not dissolve in water. When motor oil runs into storm drains either from changing your car's oil or from leaky cars, it goes directly to our lakes, rivers and the ocean. Oil and other petroleum products are toxic and can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. Did you know that one pint of oil can make a slick larger than a football field? Used motor oil is the largest single source of all oil pollution in lakes, streams and rivers. Americans spill 180 million gallons of used oil each year into our waters.

YOU CAN HELP!

- Keep your car well maintained.
- Regularly check your car for leaks and schedule tune-ups. If you find leaks or drips, have your car repaired.
- Take your car to a service center to change the oil.
- If you do change your own oil, do it in a garage, never on the street. Use a self-contained oil pan and discard the oil at a local service center for recycling.
- NEVER discard oil, gas, or antifreeze into a storm drain.
- If you spill hazardous fluids, contain it immediately with rags and cat litter. Clean up the spill and properly dispose of the waste.

WHY SHOULD YOU CARE ABOUT CLEAN WATER?

Stormwater pollution is one of the greatest threats to New Jersey's clean water supply. Clean water provides access to safe drinking water, a place for recreation, commercial opportunities, healthy wildlife habitats, and adds beauty to our landscape. Rain washes pollution from streets, parking lots, and lawns into storm drains, then directly into streams, rivers, lakes and the ocean.

Did you know more than 60 percent of water pollution comes from things like motor oil, fertilizers, pet waste, and detergents? By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater.

IF YOU USE TOO MUCH FERTILIZER ON YOUR LAWN, YOU MIGHT AS WELL FERTILIZE THE STREAM.

Rain washes pollutants into storm drains which flows directly into our streams, lakes, rivers and the ocean.

So what can you do?



WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH FERTILIZERS AND PESTICIDES?

Fertilizers help plants grow by adding nutrients to the soil. Pesticides (including herbicides) are any toxic substances used to kill insects, animals or plants. If fertilizers or pesticides are improperly applied, they can wash off your lawn or garden into storm drains and directly to our lakes, rivers, and the ocean. These chemicals can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. Too much fertilizer washing into a lake can cause algae to bloom in lakes, which will affect swimming, fishing and boating.

YOU CAN HELP!

- Test your soil at your County's Rutgers Cooperative Research and Extension office, or buy a self-test kit.
- Use natural, slow-release nitrogen, or low phosphorus fertilizers.
- Look into natural alternatives to fertilizers and pesticides, such as integrated pest management (IPM).
- If you need to use fertilizers or pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply.
- Do not apply fertilizers or pesticides before it rains. This will not allow the fertilizers or pesticides to penetrate through the soil.
- Use drought-resistant native plants in gardens; they require less fertilizer and less water.
- Use a mulching mower instead of bagging grass clippings.

Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Easy Things You Can Do Every Day To Protect Our Water

A Guide to Healthy Habits for Cleaner Water

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain into storm drains, then directly to our drinking water supplies and the ocean and lakes our children play in. Fertilizer, oil, pesticides, detergents, pet waste, grass clippings: You name it and it ends up in our water.

Stormwater pollution is one of New Jersey's greatest threats to clean and plentiful water, and that's why we're all doing something about it.

By sharing the responsibility and making small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water, and it saves the high cost of cleaning up once it's dirty.

As part of New Jersey's initiative to keep our water clean and plentiful and to meet federal requirements, many municipalities and other public agencies including colleges and military bases must adopt ordinances or other rules prohibiting various activities that contribute to stormwater pollution. Breaking these rules can result in fines or other penalties.



As a resident, business, or other member of the New Jersey community, it is important to know these easy things you can do every day to protect our water.

Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need a fertilizer.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Look into alternatives for pesticides.
- Maintain a small lawn and keep the rest of your property or yard in a natural state with trees and other native vegetation that requires little or no fertilizer.
- If you use fertilizers and pesticides, follow the instructions on the label on how to correctly apply it.



Make sure you properly store or discard any unused portions.

Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Hazardous products include some household or commercial cleaning products, lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze, and paints.
- Do not pour any hazardous products down a storm drain because storm drains are usually connected to local waterbodies and the water is not treated.

- If you have hazardous products in your home or workplace, make sure you store or dispose of them properly. Read the label for guidance.

- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.



Keep pollution out of storm drains

- Municipalities and many other public agencies are required to mark certain storm drain inlets with messages reminding people that storm drains are connected to local waterbodies.
- Do not let sewage or other wastes flow into a stormwater system.

Clean up after your pet

- Many municipalities and public agencies must enact and enforce local pet-waste rules.
- An example is requiring pet owners or their keepers to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or other people's property.
- Make sure you know your town's or agency's requirements and comply with them. It's the law. And remember to:

- Use newspaper, bags or pooper-scoopers to pick up wastes.
- Dispose of the wrapped pet waste in the trash or unwrapped in a toilet.
- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

Don't feed wildlife

- Do not feed wildlife, such as ducks and geese, in public areas.
- Many municipalities and other public agencies must enact and enforce a rule that prohibits wildlife feeding in these areas.



Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- If your municipality or agency has yard waste collection rules, follow them.
- Use leaves and grass clippings as a resource for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.



Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles.
- Recycle. Recycle. Recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.

FLUSHING – Utility personnel release water from hydrants in order to remove sediment from the water distribution system as part of routine maintenance. Flushing is also necessary to test hydrants and valves to make sure adequate flow and pressure is available. During these flushing periods you may experience temporary discoloration of your water. If this happens, please run your cold water tap for a few minutes until the water clears. If it doesn't clear the first time, wait a few minutes and run the water again. It is recommended that you make certain your water runs clear before washing clothes.

Rain washes pollutants into storm drains which flows directly into our streams, lakes, rivers and the ocean.

So what can you do?



WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH WASHING YOUR CAR?

Washing your car on a paved surface can allow the soapy wash water and other pollutants, like oil and grease, to run off into a storm drain. Most soap contains phosphates and other chemicals that, in large amounts can contaminate your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. The soap, together with the dirt and oil washed from your car, flows into nearby storm drains, which flows directly into lakes, rivers and the ocean. The phosphates from the soap can cause excess algae to grow, which can be harmful to the water quality.

YOU CAN HELP!

- Take your car to a car washing facility, rather than washing it yourself. Commercial car washes treat and recycle the water.
- If you can't get to a car washing facility, wash your car on an unpaved surface and use biodegradable soap.

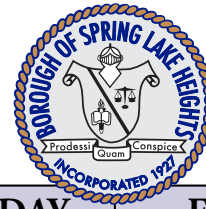

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH LITTER?

When was the last time you saw someone littering? Litter just doesn't appear - it's the result of careless actions. No matter where litter is discarded, it usually ends up in the street, where it washes down storm drains and ultimately flows to local waterways.

Littering is not only unsightly, it's a threat to wildlife and their habitat. Before you flick a cigarette bun out of your window or throw out a plastic bottle, consider this: Cigarette filters have been found in the stomachs of marine life, birds, and other animals, because they thought it was food. Birds and marine life have also been found trapped or tangled in plastic items such as six-pack drink holders, plastic bags and fishing line.

Please be considerate, and protect our wildlife and our water.

YOU CAN HELP!

Set an example for others, especially children, by not littering.

- Carry a litterbag in your car.
- Make sure trash cans have lids that can be securely fastened.
- If you have curbside trash collection, don't put loose trash in boxes.
- Prevent trash cans from being knocked over by the wind and animals.
- Tie papers in a bundle before placing them in a curbside recycling bin.
- If you own a business, check dumpsters daily to see that top and side doors are closed.
- If you or a family member is involved in a civic group, scouting, or recreational sports program, encourage the group to "adopt" a spot in your town and maintain it on a regular basis.
- Report areas where people have illegally dumped garbage and debris and ask that the material be removed.
- Volunteer to help organize a cleanup.

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM WITH PET WASTE?

Rain can wash pet waste that sits on a lawn or unpaved surface into storm drains, ultimately ending up in our lakes, rivers and the ocean. Pet waste contains coliform bacteria and other pollutants that can make people sick, and often cause beach closures on lakes or the ocean. Coliform bacteria can contaminate shellfish, which causes people to get very sick when they are eaten. Bacteria from pet waste can also pollute your drinking water, as well as kill fish, wildlife and plants. Pet waste is not only a health hazard but also a nuisance in our neighborhoods.

YOU CAN HELP!

- Use newspaper, plastic bags, or a pooper-scooper to pick up the waste when you walk your pet.
- Properly dispose of pet waste into the trash or toilet. (Do NOT dispose of newspaper or plastic bags in the toilet.)
- Do not dispose of pet waste in storm drains.

• GARBAGE, TRASH & RECYCLING REGULATIONS •

Must be out by 7:00 am the day of pick-up.

Collections may be cancelled during SNOWSTORMS and other WEATHER EMERGENCIES.

After snow events please place your garbage and recycling to the curb or shovel an adequate path to provide safe access.




GARBAGE Only garbage which is generated in the Borough will be collected from residential and commercial users.

- Loose garbage in a can will NOT BE COLLECTED.
- Collection is limited to three (3) containers per collection date.
- Containers must have handles and cannot exceed 32 gallons in size.
- Loaded containers in excess of 50 lbs. weight will not be collected.
- Containers must be kept sanitary and free of water and ice.
- Containers at the curb should be placed no earlier than the night before and no later than 7:00 a.m. on the collection date. Empty containers cannot be left at the curb overnight or on weekends.
- Except where curbside collection is required (condominiums) containers may also be placed for collection at any accessible site in the rear yard. There will be no collection from fenced yards or where free access is hampered. Email sanitation@springlakehts.com to begin this service.

VEGETATIVE WASTE

- **BRUSH** and branches (maximum 6 feet length or 12 inches diameter) can be placed curbside on scheduled dates. This collection is for tree pruning not whole trees. Quantity is limited to a single pile not exceeding 5 feet wide, 5 feet high and 10 feet long. Small clippings (twigs, vines and hedge trimmings) should be separated from larger brush and placed curbside in a sturdy open-top container no earlier than 2 days before scheduled brush collection dates.
- **LEAVES** must be placed loose in piles along the curb or street edge no earlier than 2 days before scheduled collection and must be at least 10 feet from all storm-water drainage inlets. Leaves CANNOT be mixed with vines, twigs, brush. Bagged leaves CANNOT be collected.
- **GRASS CLIPPINGS** are strictly prohibited, will not be collected and are not accepted at the Spring Lake Heights Recycling Center. Residents are encouraged to "cut it and leave it" to improve the health of your lawn.
- **NO BAMBOO** - SMALL quantities can be collected on BULK TRASH days.

RECYCLING The following materials must be separated for collection:

- **MIXED PAPER:** newspapers, magazines, catalogs, office paper, junk mail, flattened cardboard and paperboard (cereal boxes) can be placed in the same container for collection.
- **BOTTLES & CANS:** plastic   **OR** , glass, tin or aluminum bottles, jars and cans can be placed in the same container for collection.

Place recyclables in sturdy, open-top containers not exceeding 32 gallons or 50 lbs. weight. **(RECYCLING IN A PLASTIC BAG WILL NOT BE COLLECTED)**

- **NO STYROFOAM** - Throw out with household garbage.

BULK TRASH Any trash which cannot be placed in a container, including household furniture and appliances, can be placed curbside for collection no earlier than 2 days before scheduled BULK TRASH dates. **BULK TRASH IS NOT INTENDED FOR HOUSE CLEANOUTS OR MOVING. ONLY** reasonable amounts will be collected. All metal should be placed in a separate pile.

- **APPLIANCES** and electronics (TVs, computers) should be placed curbside for collection on BULK TRASH dates. Please remove refrigerator doors.
- **CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS:** only small quantities from routine maintenance (no fencing or sheds) will be collected on BULK TRASH dates. Email sanitation@springlakehts.com to arrange for disposal of small quantities of concrete material or bricks.

OTHER ITEMS

- **BATTERIES** (household) can be discarded with regular garbage.
- **PAINT CANS** (empty) and dried latex paint should be discarded with regular garbage. (Paint hardener is available at hardware stores.)
- **MOTOR OIL** can be taken to any motor vehicle re-inspection station.
- **TIRE** disposal - Monmouth County Reclamation Center in Tinton Falls.
- **Monmouth County Permanent Household Hazardous Waste Facility (732-683-8686)** in Tinton Falls for pesticides, fertilizers, motor oil, antifreeze, pool chemicals, car batteries, gasoline and oil paints.
